From the Pulpit Rev. Doug Neel

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

I am in Texas taking a few days of rest, visiting friends and family. Right now we are at a pecan plantation north of Paris, Texas that belongs to Sally's family. It has rained recently so everything is green and beautiful. I must say that it is somewhat hotter and more humid (96 degrees with 85% humidity) than I have experienced since moving to Pagosa.

I still have the taste of Pentecost in my mouth. It was a wonderful celebration of the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives and in the life of our parish. Our foreign language readers did a magnificent job. The choir and liturgical ministers were wonderful. The woodpeckers stayed away from the church. All in all, it was a spirit-filled service.

For the first century Jews, Pentecost was an "outreach" festivity. The occasion was the completion of the grain harvest. Communities had large celebrations with tables filled with food. And everyone was invited, including "the widow, the

orphan and the foreigner in our midst." This was the one celebration of the year where the wealthiest members of the community sat next to the poorest, all eating the same food. I think it is fascinating that the Christian Pentecost, the giving of the



Holy Spirit, happened within the context of the Jewish Pentecost, the sharing of the harvest bounty with the poorest members of the community.

The bidding of the Holy Spirit can be difficult and can cause us to move into areas of discomfort. Remember the story of the Spirit sending Jesus into the wilderness immediately after his baptism? The result however, is growth. Jesus went into the desert to discern what impact

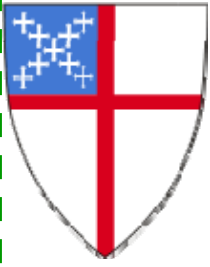
his baptism would have on the rest of his life. What kind of Messiah would he be? What kind of Kingdom would he preach and witness? My experience is that the steps to personal growth are always unsettling at the best and can be quite painful.

The bidding of the Holy Spirit can also bring great joy. In many ways, the Book of Acts is a "Spirit" book, telling the story of the Holy Spirit in the early church. Despite persecution, prison, and execution, the early Christians lived in a state of great joy, with an overarching sense of excitement and commitment to what they were doing. I don't see us going to prison for our belief and ministry, but I do hope that we experience the excitement and joy.

Early Service

Speaking of excitement and joy, the vestry and I have decided to experiment with a second Sunday service during the latter summer months. We have been in discussions about a second service for some time now. Beginning

Spotlight on Fr. Doug Neel



Tell us a little about how you came to Pagosa and why you choose to worship at St.

Patrick's. My road here had more hurdles than most of you. Before coming to Pagosa, I had to be approved by your calling committee, called by the vestry and approved by the bishop. But in reality, my family and I immediately fell in love with the people of St Patrick's and the beauty surrounding this wonderful community and really wanted to be here with you. This will be my second year as your priest.

Please share a bit about your background? Where you were raised ... your family, etc? My father was a professor at the University of Arkansas, in Fayetteville. I was raised as an Episcopalian in a family that attended church every Sunday. I have a bachelor's degree in music and taught music for four years. I received my master's in theology from Nashotah House in Wisconsin. Most of my subsequent career has been in Dallas, where I have been involved in parish ministry, worked for a telecommunications research company, served on the board of a charitable non-profit agency called *Dallas Common*, and ran my own catering company. I met and married Sally in Dallas, which is one of the better decisions I have made. And I have three children: Charles (age 30), Katherine (age 27), and Robert (age 17).

What is your favorite book and why? I read a lot and have a number of favorites, so choosing just one or two is difficult. I am quite fond of the bible, but I am guessing you expect that. Regardless of whether one believes it literally, it contains tremendous truth, great wisdom and wonderful stories. I strongly recommend it. *The River Why* by James David Duncan is a recent favorite. It is a story of a spiritual journey through fly fishing. It caused me to laugh out loud frequently. I am a huge fan of *A Year of Living Biblically* by A.J. Jacobs. Be prepared to laugh out loud if you read it. *Shogun*, by James Clavell is an old friend that I return to read from time to time. I also enjoy reading cookbooks and books about cooking, though I rarely use recipes.

What is your favorite movie and why? My favorite comedy is *Moonstruck* with Cher and Nicholas Cage. It is a show about life as a New York Italian that is artfully woven together with the opera *La Boheme*. A foreign film called *Babette's Feast* is my other favorite. It is truly a sacramental foretaste of the Kingdom of God. It was written by Isak Dinesen, the real life *Out of Africa* lady.

What types of things do you enjoy doing with your free time? I suspect that most of you know I enjoy fly fishing. I am not a great angler, but from time to time I do catch fish. I tie my own flies, which are not beautiful, but they do manage to fool an occasional, really stupid trout. I also love to cook and I make my own cheese. A walk in the woods is always high on my list and so is a quiet evening with a book, listening to Sally play the piano.

Are there ministries that you particularly enjoy being involved with at St. Pat's? All of them. I have to say that I am particularly fond of helping with Loaves & Fishes and that I am very pleased with the success of the Sunday Night Unplugged services. It is "for the best" that I do not help make the prayer quilts. They are radiant and would only be less beautiful with my inadequate assistance.

Are there other organizations or activities outside of church that are important to you? Habitat for Humanity and the Pagosa Outreach Connection are very important to our community. Both organizations have done wonderful things for people who need their assistance the most. Big Brothers, Big Sisters is a great mentoring program. I have served as a mentor and know how much an hour or two a week can touch the life of a child. I must also plug Music Boosters. They have given me a small part in the upcoming performance of *Annie*. Despite my acting and singing, it will be a wonderful show.

Looking to the future ... what changes would you like to see in St. Patrick's? I want to see more of the same. We are a very friendly church; I want us to be the friendliest church in the diocese. We do a decent job of inviting others to join us; I would love to see the church filled with our friends and neighbors every week. I guess most of all is that I hope all of us take our discipleship to Christ very seriously and that it is reflected in our prayer, worship, stewardship, outreach, and in our desire to grow spiritually.

Can you give us an example of a time that St. Patrick's played an important role in your life? It was just a little over one year ago that I had intestinal surgery. I was in the hospital for seven days. The prayer quilt you gave me was a cherished sign of your concern and prayers. Your many visits helped to lift my spirits and your thoughts and prayers helped me considerably. When I returned home, I was provided with wonderful food and assistance.

What's something you think members would enjoy knowing about you? Two little-known facts: I am a co-inventor of three telecommunications patents and I am writing a book on first century food and culture.

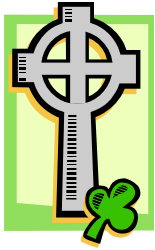
We are ambitious in our desire to help this community; with food, shelter, clothing and comfort. Witness all we do here: Food Boxes, Clothing Give-a-way, Loaves and Fishes, Helping Hands, Habitat for Humanity, Navajo land, funds from the Shamrock Festival and Prayer quilts, to name a few.

We are also ambitious for ourselves, in our relationship to God, our faith walk with Christ and deepening our spirituality. We hunger for new ways and for new tools to help us accomplish this life long goal. Witness our Sunday school, Spiritus, and again, "Living the Spiritual Life".

So with ambition comes need for time, talent and treasure to keep all these programs fueled with energy, people, funds and the appropriate tools. This is a good time at the mid-year point to personally assess your commitment to St. Patrick's in terms of time, talent and treasure. Take an opportunity to study the Ministry List. Where do you fit? Do you feel you are doing all you can do?

Challenges Jim Vierbicher, Sr. Warden



During 2007 Fr. Robert Pope made it known that he would retire in the summer of 2008, as required by the Diocese.

Subsequently, the congregation was surveyed as to their desires regarding a full-time Rector and characteristics and emphases for the "new" church program. (Fr. Pope served at 60% as interim Rector.) As you know, the recommendation and decisions were to retain a full-time Rector and develop those programs attendant to a full-time ministry.

We knew that the course chosen would not be without its **CHALLENGES**, both financially and in the work that would be required. Evangelism, stewardship and spiritual education for all ages were to be emphasized. It was envisioned that at least three years would be required to transition from an interim and part-time rector program. We are now mid-way in that transition period.

Little did we know when we embarked on that ambitious course that an economic recession, second only to that of the Great Depression, would envelope us soon. That recession has and continues to affect,

to **CHALLENGE** virtually everyone. Jobs have been, are being lost. Homes are being foreclosed. I've been told that economically, Archuleta county is one of the most, if not the most, adversely affected, counties in Colorado. Our food pantry is on course to pass out 500 food boxes this year (we did 325 last year and less than 100 in 2007). Loaves and Fishes served 423 meals a couple of weeks ago; there are requests to Fr. Doug's discretionary fund weekly.

Then of course there is the natural ebb and flow of a congregation. Families come and go as their interests and needs change. St. Patrick's is no different. Recently, we've had some really involved families move; some leave for extended periods of time. There probably will be more such moves and to the extent these are some of our more active families, the void is huge. This has left vacancies on the Vestry, on many of our committees, with general work around the church and office, and a void in many of the other ministries and activities of St. Patrick's. This is yet another **CHALLENGE**.

But do not despair! The glass is half full! We have been blessed with an excellent Rector. The number of

activities and opportunities to serve have grown tremendously as noted in Linda Altman's message. There are new people in church on almost every Sunday and, at our Sunday night services. We have had baptisms and confirmations. And, financially we are okay. Our contributions are up, as are our expenses - we now are responsible for the Rector's full medical insurance premium, an increase of \$14,000 for the year. Our deficit last year was \$30,000; we are down somewhat from that this year but we have a ways to go if we are to be at breakeven at the end of year three. It's just one more **CHALLENGE**.

Can we meet these **CHALLENGES**? Of course we can! Are we all going to have to step up and do a bit more? I believe the answer is yes. But in the end, we will be successful. I would ask that each of us, myself included, ask if we are really putting forth the effort and commitment that is consistent with our relationship to our Lord, and then by all means pray.

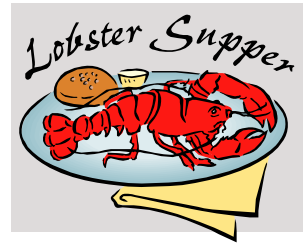
